CLE INSTRUCTIONS FOR CONFERENCE ATTENDEES

International law, and the world in which it operates, are increasingly both harmonious and dissonant. The American Society of International Law's Annual Meeting in 2011 focuses on the evolution of international law in the context of this paradox. In line with this theme, the following CLE courses, taught by internationally renowned international legal practitioners and scholars, cover an array of topics, including human rights law, trade and finance, dispute resolution and environmental law.

Attendees of the ASIL 105th Annual Meeting have the opportunity to select from seventeen (17) courses over the course of three days (from Thursday, March 24, 2011 to Saturday, March 26, 2011) and can earn up to 10.5 continuing legal education credits.

Each course is facilitated by a moderator who is responsible for keeping speakers on time. Courses are 90 minutes, with 45-60 minutes allocated for presentation and 30-45 minutes at the end for 'Questions & Answers.' All course written materials are provided on compact disc (CD) to attendees at the Annual Meeting registration table. A session attendance sheet is displayed at the entrance of each course room and is monitored by ASIL staff.

SESSION ATTENDANCE SHEET

At the beginning and end of each session, each attendee must print his/her name, the state in which he/she is admitted to the bar, and his/her bar number(s) on the attendance sheet circulated at each seminar. Attorneys uncertain whether their particular state bar association requires attorney bar numbers are advised to provide the number. PLEASE REMEMBER TO SIGN IN AND OUT OF ALL SESSION COURSES!

UNIFORM CERTIFICATE OF ATTENDANCE

To obtain CLE credit you must **ALSO** complete a UNIFORM CERTIFICATE OF ATTENDANCE (UCOA) for each state where your CLE credit hours are to be reported. Within 30 days of this activity (or annually, if required), the ATTORNEY MUST FILE the UCOA (CLE Form) with his/her MCLE state agency.* Therefore, the form must correspond with the total credit hours accumulated from the session courses you attended and verified by the COURSE ATTENDANCE SHEET (mentioned above). This uniform certificate substitutes for the state supplied forms.

***PENNSYLVANIA**

ASIL is a Pennsylvania Accredited Provider and will file a Roster Report that indicates the names of Pennsylvania lawyers who are to receive credit, their Pennsylvania Lawyer ID numbers and the amount of credit they are to receive within thirty (30) days of the Annual Meeting. As an Accredited Provider, ASIL shall also pay the \$1.50 per credit hour attendance fee with each attendance report.

***NEW YORK**

Under New York's approved jurisdiction policy, New York grants CLE credits for course approved by Pennsylvania. Each 90 minute session is 1.5 CLE credits. When reporting your credits to New York, note that they are considered professional practice credits and that the level of difficulty is appropriate for newly admitted attorneys. **Please also note that New York requires that you retain a copy of this informational handout as documentation of these categorizations.**
