LEAD ESSAY TACKLES POLICY TOWARD ROGUE STATES

WASHINGTON, DC—The American Society of International Law (ASIL) announces that the third issue of the 101st volume of its flagship publication, the *American Journal of International Law*, is now available.

The current issue of the *Journal* includes a lead essay by Jonathan B. Schwartz entitled “Dealing with a ‘Rogue State’: The Libya Precedent.” This piece explores the international and domestic legal tools used by U.S. policymakers who worked to transform Libya from a deadly enemy into a partner in the fight against terrorism and the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction. Additionally, the essay discusses the potential success of the application of those strategies to other “rogue states” that pose similar threats to international peace and security.

Also in this issue are Aiyaz Husain’s Note, “The United States and the Failure of UN Collective Security: Palestine, Kashmir, and Indonesia, 1947–1948,” William Butler’s Note, “Sino-Soviet Secret Diplomacy and the Foreign Investor,” and Stephen Mathias’ Current Development piece, “The 2006 Judicial Activity of the International Court of Justice.” The issue includes two case reports, a section on the latest developments in contemporary U.S. practice relating to international law, and eight book

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reviews.

The *Journal* has been published quarterly since 1907 and, according to the online periodical resource JSTOR, is “considered the premier English-language scholarly journal in its field.” The *Journal* features essays, editorials, and comments by preeminent scholars on developments in international law and international relations. It contains summaries and analyses of decisions by courts and tribunals and of contemporary U.S. practice in international law. Each issue also lists and reviews recent books on international law.
