DISCUSSION OF UPCOMING ICJ CASES AVAILABLE ONLINE

WASHINGTON, DC – The American Society of International Law (ASIL), in cooperation with the DC Bar International Law Section/International Dispute Resolution Committee, recently cosponsored a program on upcoming cases before the International Court of Justice (ICJ), which is now viewable online, via FORA.tv, at [http://fora.tv/2007/10/03/International Court of Justice Road Ahead](http://fora.tv/2007/10/03/International_Court_of_Justice_Road_Ahead).

The International Court of Justice: The Road Ahead featured ASIL members **David A. Colson**, Of Counsel, LeBoeuf, Lamb, Greene & MacRae LLP (now Dewey and LeBoeuf); **John R. Crook**, Commissioner, Eritrea-Ethiopia Claims Commission, and frequent Counsel for the U.S. in past ICJ cases; and **Ruth Wedgwood**, U.S. member, UN Human Rights Committee, and Professor of International Law, Johns Hopkins' School for Advanced International Studies. ASIL member **Stephen M. Schwebel**, former Judge and President of the ICJ, moderated this event, which was attended by more than 100 Washington, DC, area lawyers and law students.
