**UN RAPPORTEUR PRESENTATION ON U.S. FIGHT AGAINST TERRORISM**

*Protecting Human Rights and Countering Terrorism* featured Scheinin's explanation of his October 25 report (also available from the link above) criticizing several aspects of current U.S. law and practice in the fight against terrorism. ASIL member **Ken Anderson**, Professor at American University's Washington College of Law and member of the Hoover Institution Task Force on National Security and Law, provided a critical assessment of Scheinin's findings and recommendations to the U.S. The hour-and-a-half long event included questions from the audience, which consisted of nearly 100 representatives from the U.S. and foreign governments, non-governmental organizations, and the press.
