**LATEST JOURNAL ARTICLES FOCUS ON HUMAN RIGHTS AND
TRADE TREATY THEMES**

WASHINGTON, DC—The American Society of International Law (ASIL) announces that the first issue of the 102nd volume of its flagship publication, the *American Journal of International Law*, is now available. This latest issue of the *Journal* includes a lead article by ASIL member **John H. Knox** entitled “*Horizontal Human Rights Law*.” His article explores the risks of reorienting human rights “horizontally” by imposing obligations directly on corporations and other private actors.

The other lead article is by **Nicholas Di Mascio** and **Joost Pauwelyn**. Their essay “*Nondiscrimination in Trade and Investment Treaties: Worlds Apart or Two Sides of the Same Coin?*” explains how, for different reasons, both trade and investment treaties use “national treatment” provisions to prohibit discrimination against foreigners through domestic law.

Also in this issue are ASIL member **Steve Charnovitz**’s Editorial Comment on “*The ILO Convention on Freedom of Association and Its Future in the United States*,” as well as ASIL member **Charles N. Brower**’s memorial notice for past ASIL President **William D. Rogers** (1927–2007). The issue includes six case reports, a section

on the latest developments in contemporary U.S. practice relating to international law, and eight book reviews.

The *Journal* has been published quarterly since 1907 and, according to the online periodical resource JSTOR, is “considered the premier English-language scholarly journal in its field.” The *Journal* features essays, editorials, and comments by preeminent scholars on developments in international law and international relations. It includes summaries and analyses of decisions by courts and tribunals and the latest developments in contemporary U.S. practice in international law. Each issue also lists and reviews recent books on international law.
