LATEST JOURNAL EXAMINES CIVILIAN DETENTIONS

WASHINGTON, DC—The American Society of International Law (ASIL) announces that the first issue of the 103rd volume of its flagship publication, the *American Journal of International Law*, is now available.

This latest issue of the *Journal* features an Editorial Comment by Harvard Law School Professor and ASIL member **Ryan Goodman** entitled “**The Detention of Civilians in Armed Conflict.**” The piece explores principles of detention within international humanitarian law and examines how they relate to U.S. detention of civilians following September 11, 2001, in the conflict with Al Qaeda.

This *Journal* also includes a lead article by Vanderbilt Law School Professor and ASIL member **Laurence Helfer**, Northwestern Law School Professor **Karen Alter**, and **Florencia Guerzovich** of Northwestern University Law School entitled “**Islands of Effective International Adjudication: Constructing an Intellectual Property Rule of Law in the Andean Community.**” The piece discusses how the intellectual property rulings of the Andean Tribunal of Justice have emerged as an effective means of international adjudication and looks at the role they play in building the rule of law.

Also in this issue is a Note entitled “**The War Powers Resolution, Once Again**” by Tufts University Professor and ASIL member **Michael Glennon**. Five case reports, a section on the latest developments in contemporary U.S. practice relating to international law, and five book reviews are included as well.

The *Journal* has been published quarterly since 1907 and, according to the online periodical resource JSTOR, is “considered the premier English-language scholarly journal in its field.” The *Journal* regularly features articles, editorials, and comments by preeminent scholars on developments in international law and international relations. It also includes analyses of decisions by courts and tribunals. In addition, each issue lists and reviews recent books on international law.
