NEW *JOURNAL* FEATURES ARTICLE ON EXCHANGE RATE MANIPULATION AND INTERNATIONAL LAW

WASHINGTON, DC—The American Society of International Law (ASIL) announces that the third issue of the 105th volume of its flagship publication, the *American Journal of International Law*, is now available.

The issue's lead article, "**Exchange Rate Misalignment and International Law**" by ASIL member **Claus Zimmermann** (University of Oxford Faculty of Law), examines the barriers faced by efforts to control exchange rate manipulation through international law. The article proposes that the problems associated with exchange rate manipulation will only be solved through political cooperation, rather than international law.

The 105th (2011) volume of the *Journal* is the first in the periodical's 100-plus-year history to be published online simultaneously with its traditional print counterpart. Through a new partnership with the nonprofit, online, scholarly periodical resource [JSTOR](#), the *Journal*, along with the Society's other top two periodicals—[International Legal Materials](#) and the Annual Meeting [Proceedings](#)—are now available electronically at no extra cost to ASIL members.

The *Journal* has been published quarterly since 1907 and, according to JSTOR, is “considered the premier English-language scholarly journal in its field.” The *Journal* regularly features articles, editorials, and comments by preeminent scholars on developments in international law and international relations. It also includes analyses of decisions by courts and tribunals, and lists and reviews recent books on international law.
