### **Recent Developments in the Law of the Sea:**

- United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS) resolutions: Bipartisan resolutions calling on the U.S. Senate to give its advice and consent to the ratification of UNCLOS have been introduced in both houses of the U.S. Congress. <u>H. Res. 361</u> and <u>S. Res. 220</u> specify some of the advantages to the United States of acceding to the Convention, and recommend ratification remain a "top priority for the Federal Government." No action has yet been taken on the resolutions since their introduction in April and May of 2021, respectively.
- Russia Assumes Arctic Council Chairmanship: At the most Arctic Council Ministerial Meeting in May 2021, the Russian Federation <u>assumed the chairmanship</u> of the Arctic Council until 2023. Iceland had previously held the chairmanship since 2019. Russia has promised to utilize its chairmanship to strengthen regional cooperation and promote sustainable development.
- Russia's Updated Continental Shelf Claim: On April 1, 2021, the United Nations confirmed receipt of two <u>addenda</u> filed by the Russian Federation to its 2015 submissions to the Commission on the Limits of the Continental Shelf (CLCS). The addenda relate to well-known features in the Arctic Ocean, including the Gakkel and Lomonosov Ridges, as well as the Mendeleev Rise. The claims overlap with those of Canada and the Kingdom of Denmark.
- Mauritius-Maldives Boundary Settlement Dispute: On January 28, 2021, the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea (ITLOS) issued a <u>ruling</u> in a boundary dispute matter between Mauritius and The Maldives that rejected UK sovereignty over the British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT), also called the Chagos Archipelago. The ruling gave legal effect to an earlier advisory opinion from the International Court of Justice (ICJ) that found the UK was under an obligation to end its administration of the BIOT as rapidly as possible. The ruling has implications for the United States, which has leased the island of Diego Garcia from the UK for military purposes.


