Indigenous Rights Developments

Oct 6, 2025: UN Human Rights Council Resolution 60/13 on Human rights and Indigenous Peoples (contributed by Muhammad Farrel Abhyoso)—On October 6, 2025, during its sixtieth session, the UN Human Rights Council adopted Resolution 60/13 on the matter of "Human rights and Indigenous Peoples." In the resolution, the Council noted that Indigenous Peoples continue to struggle with poor social and economic conditions, along with high rates of violence, incarceration, and disability. The Council noted the impact of climate change on Indigenous Peoples' ways of life while also recognizing their resilience in facing the climate crisis. It acknowledged the High Commissioner for Human Rights' report regarding the rights of Indigenous Peoples and instructed the High Commissioner to continue submitting an annual report on that topic. The UN's ongoing liquidity crisis is a cause of concern, with its impact on the work of the Office of the High Commissioner, the Special Rapporteur on the rights of Indigenous Peoples, and the Expert Mechanism on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. Nevertheless, the Council urged States, Indigenous Peoples, and other relevant stakeholders to continue engaging with the Expert Mechanism, such as by participating in Expert Mechanism sessions and contributing to its studies and reports. The need to preserve Indigenous Peoples' languages is also a focus of the resolution, with the Council noting that 2022-2032 is the International Decade of Indigenous Languages and encouraging that measures be taken to promote and preserve those languages. The Council also urged States as well as the private sector to facilitate Indigenous Peoples' participation in the development of artificial intelligence, and emphasized the importance of empowering Indigenous women and girls, including those with disabilities politically, socially, and economically.
